October Holidays

Yom Kippur --- The Day of Atonement—is the holiest day of the year in the Jewish faith. Falling in the month of Tishrei (September or October in the Gregorian calendar) it marks the culmination of the 10 Days of Awe, a period of introspection and repentance that follows Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year. According to tradition, it is on Yom Kippur that God decides each person's fate, so Jews are encouraged to make amends and ask forgiveness for sins committed during the past year. The holiday is observed with a 25-hour fast and a special religious service, usually at Synagogue, and sin confessions. Some minor Jewish denominations such as Reconstructionist Judaism, focus less on sins and more on one's goals and accomplishments and setting yearly intentions. Yom Kippur and Rosh Hashanah are known as Judaism's "High Holy Days" with Yom Kippur being the most sacred day of the year. Yom Kippur 2025 begins October 1, 2025 at sundown and ends at nightfall on October 2, 2025.

Halloween—Halloween is a well-known holiday observed on October 31. The tradition originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, a time when people believed that the souls of those who had died returned to visit their homes. The people would light bon-fires on hilltops to frighten away evil spirits and sometimes wore costumes to avoid being recognized by the ghosts thought to be present. It was in those ways that beings such as witches, goblins, vampires, and demons came to be associated with the day. Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities, one of which is the practice of pulling usually harmless pranks. Celebrants wear masks and costumes for trick-or-treating, and go from house to house with the threat that they will pull a trick if they do not receive a treat, usually candy. Unfortunately, in some places, warnings became necessary about adulterated Halloween candy and apples being given. Along with skeletons and black cats, the holiday has incorporated other scary beings such as the Jack-o'-lantern. ALL FOR FUN!!
